



# Viva España

IBERIAN BRILLIANCE COMES TO BRITAIN IN THE FORM OF CONVERSATIONAL SPANISH 2, AN EXHIBITION OF YOUNG DESIGNERS WHO REALLY HAVE SOMETHING TO SAY

**K**eenness to embrace the new epitomises modern Spain and has been key to the revitalisation of Spanish industry. It's an enthusiasm that's taking on new momentum, with manufacturers becoming proactive in seeking out fresh design talent and developing exciting collaborations.

During the London Design Festival the Noel Hennessy showroom will be home to Conversational Spanish 2 (14-24 September), an exhibition curated by Héctor Serrano highlighting products from companies that are embracing the new. Serrano, a London resident, is known for his use of humble materials. His Superpatata lamp, made of a latex balloon filled with salt and a light bulb, ended up in the catalogue of ultra-

directional Dutch design group Droog. He still designs for Spanish companies and is excited by the way that product design and production are joining hands in Spain. "Whereas Britain produces designers but has a small manufacturing industry, in Spain both industries are booming," he says. The result is a wave of unconventional products combining commercial and cultural success.

Serrano has enveloped the exhibition space in blue, yellow, red and black stripes created with electrical tape – a fittingly industrial material. The exhibits, which are in colours that match the stripes, include three of Serrano's own. Each, in its own way, exemplifies this attitude of experimental collaboration.

## ABR

ABR is a young company determined not to be restricted to a narrow range of products and keen to foster relations with designers with eccentric ideas. To this end the company does not manufacture anything, instead choosing the most appropriate producers for each individual project. A small catalogue includes items as diverse as felt room dividers, metal tables and a memory stick in the shape of the Madona designed by Luis Eslava. This epitomises the company's belief that the design world needs a sense of humour. The buttocks of Michelangelo's David were the inspiration for Cui es Cool, a versatile seat designed by Ramón Ubeda (above) and Otto Canvalda. The lightweight stool is made from expanded polystyrene – a more sturdy version of polystyrene.

## ARTURO ALVAREZ

The latest lighting design by Héctor Serrano (right) was produced by Arturo Alvarez, a handmade lighting company in Santiago de Compostela with an interest in the innovative use of materials such as silicone and polycarbonate. The company produces meticulously finished lighting products in limited series. Serrano's V lamp in black polycarbonate conjoined 'V' shapes (pictured) is inspired by a flexi-comb hair accessory and makes good use of Arturo Alvarez's manufacturing capabilities, marking the beginning of what promises to be a fruitful run of collaborations with contemporary designers.

## MARTÍ GUIXÉ

Marti Guixé is one of Spain's new breed of up-and-coming designers and one of the five founders of Barcelona-based B-Signs. The firm's first products helped win it a best business idea award in 2002. These included a wall-mounted organiser for the bathroom, and the B-Mirror (pictured with reflected foliage) which is unbreakable and can be hooked up wherever you feel the need to pimp your bathroom.



Puntmóbiles was founded in Valencia in 1980 by a group of designers keen to develop innovative projects in the fields of domestic, contract and project furnishings. The Dedal stool (pictured) designed by Ana Mir (above, left) and Emili Padrós (above, right) under the name Emiliaña may remind a UK audience of a Dalek more than a sewing accessory. The lightweight, stackable stool comes with a soft, rounded seat which adapts to the shape of the sitter. ### METALARTE

Under the direction of the founder's grandson Román Riera, the company has fostered relations with a new breed of designers to come up with innovative lighting products such as Serrano's Top Secret (2001), his Waterproof (2004), and Inout (2003) by Ramón Ubeda and Otto Canalda. Henne Oscar (above) and Mónica García (top) collaborated with Metalarte to produce the Campanela lamp (pictured), a ceramic cone held up by a rope featuring knots resembling those used by climbers.
